#### **Next Gen GST Reform**

The Index Institute of Management, Arts & Sciences (IIMAS), Malwanchal University, Indore, organized an insightful Knowledge Series session on 5th September 2025 focused on the Next Gen GST Reform. Assistant Professor Subhash Choudhary from the Commerce Department led the discussion, explaining historical context and recent changes in India's GST policy. The session highlighted the revised tax slabs, notably the reduction of rates on essential goods to 0-5%, providing relief to consumers, while luxury and sin products faced higher rates between 28-40%. Attended by faculty members, department heads, and 50 participants, the event underscored how GST 2.0 aims to simplify the tax system, improve administrative efficiency, and support economic growth. The knowledge-sharing session equipped students with a comprehensive understanding of this pivotal reform, preparing them for its real-world implications.

Reality: Blended learning works best—digital tools offer flexibility, but leadership, strategy, and behavior need face-to-face interaction.

Myth 2: A degree guarantees a high-paying job.

Reality: Careers depend on skills, internships, networking, and adaptability, not just a degree.

Myth 3: Only study what interests you.

Reality: Core subjects like finance, operations, and marketing are essential for long-term success.

Myth 4: Soft skills are secondary.

Reality: Leadership, communication, and emotional intelligence are as crucial as technical skills.

Myth 5: Entrepreneurship is the only cool career.


Reality: Startups matter, but corporate roles and intrapreneurship can be equally impactful.

#### **FIVE LAWS OF LIBRARY SCIENCE**

Dr. Shiyali Ramamritra Ranganathan (1892-1972) was an inventor, educator, philosopher, mathematician and a universal librarian. He made several significant contributions to the library profession. A fundamental contribution made by him, is the Five Laws of Library Science. He formulated the Five Laws of Library Science in 1928 and published these in his famous book entitled, "Five Laws of Library Science" in 1931. He owes the First Law to Prof. Edward N. Ross, his mathematics teacher, and the other laws were enunciated by Ranganathan himself.

The Five Laws of Library Science are the most influential concept in the field of library science. They are fundamental and discuss the basic philosophy of library science. They concisely represent the ideal services and organizational philosophy of all types of libraries, even today. These laws provide scientific basis and general principles which serve as guidelines to librarians in organizing and managing information products and services.

#### Five Laws are as follows: -


- 1. Books are for use.

Organizations can sustain high performance even in the face of constant change when they connect their vision, dynamic capabilities, cultural adaptability, and performance indicators.

# Heritage, Tourism, and Commodification: A Complex Interplay

Heritage, tourism, and commodification interact in complex ways, shaping both economic opportunities and cultural challenges for communities. As tourism grows, elements of cultural heritage—traditions, sites, and crafts—are transformed into commodities for tourist consumption, offering local populations economic benefits and cultural revitalization. However, this process can erode authenticity, with cultural expressions tailored to meet tourist expectations rather than reflecting their original significance.

Commodification can revive nearly forgotten customs and provide a sense of pride, but excessive commercialization risks reducing heritage to mere souvenirs or performances. Balancing economic interests with cultural preservation remains crucial to ensure that heritage tourism supports both sustainable livelihoods and the authentic continuation of local traditions.


